

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Lessons Learned

Challenges

- Jr CHWs would primarily work weekends and after school hours.
- Develop robust evaluation tools to assess Jr. CHW impact and outcomes.

Highlights

- Jr CHWs were engaged in all aspects of community efforts.
- Utilized their free time to engage peers at school.
- Developed interpersonal and leadership skills.
- Educated and empowered families and friends.



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How Do We Continue to Incorporate Young People in Public Health Matters?

- Jr CHW programs are able to incorporate a wide variety of personalities.
- Planning ahead thinking through what a healthy workload looks like for Jr. CHWs.
- Continue to allow younger people to have a voice in local level conversations about their health and safety.





Youth Advisory Council (YAC)

Two-way sharing of information and resources

- YAC provides immediate feedback during training
- PPN will establish proposals for best practices
- PPN will seek feedback on proposals from YAC to inform policy changes
- Through strengthening of community relationships and co-investment with stakeholders,
 PPN will refer YAC members as change-agents to serve D.C.'s health needs
 - YAC members will select projects/opportunities based on their own interests
 - Gives YAC members agency and choice in their own professional development
 - YAC members will provide feedback to optimize relationships and opportunities
- PPN can establish its own local/national opportunities for YAC members to participate in

Future Steps

Complete Curriculum and Implement Program!

Research Goals:

- Improve baseline knowledge of social drivers of health and health justice issues
- Develop critical consciousness the capacity to recognize socio-political inequities and act towards personal and collective improvement for health justice issues
- Improve perceptions of community resilience by exposing students to resources and organizations in their community
- Increase critical action based behaviors by serving on a Youth Advisory Council for the Pediatric Pandemic Network and by referring them as change-agents for other key stakeholders

Other goals

- Enhance community partnerships
- Establish sustainability
