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Background

- 2014: Oregon Emergency Medical Services for Children (EMSC) recruited Family Representative from the Oregon Family to Family Health Information Center (F2F)
- 2019: Inspiration: STARS program → Health Emergency Ready Oregon (HERO) Kids Registry
- 2019 2022: Right people, right time, right infrastructure

What is Health Emergency Ready Oregon (HERO) Kids Registry?





What is HERO Kids Registry?

- Voluntary, no-cost, secure registry
- Oregon families and young adults share critical health information before an emergency occurs
- Emergency medical services (EMS) and hospital emergency department (ED) providers can quickly and easily access information



Who is HERO Kids for?



- Any Oregon child or young adult through age 26
- Especially useful for young people with:
 - complicated or chronic health conditions
 - developmental disabilities
 - > mental health conditions

Why register with HERO Kids?

By registering with HERO Kids, families give EMS and ED providers a head start on understanding their child or young adult's medical history and unique needs. The information may help them provide more informed care or comfort.

For example:

- Flashing lights may trigger seizures
- Specific words may calm the child or young adult
- Child or young adult does not communicate with spoken language

This is a way for families to get their words into the ears of EMS



How does the Registry work?



In an emergency: The person calling 911 will give the dispatcher or arriving EMS the HERO Kids Registry ID number, or tell them that the child or young adult is registered (if known)

Once EMS and ED providers know a child or young adult is registered **or** have enough information to identify them:

- Call the confidential provider line
- Connect through the OREMS app
- Receive an Emergency Department Information Exchange (EDIE) alert
 - ➤ The alert will direct them to the provider line or to view directly within the Collective Medical Portal

The information is available in fewer than 90 seconds.

Who can access HERO Kids Registry, and is it secure?

Hero Kids Registry is a secure, HIPAA-compliant database. It is operated by Registry staff trained to comply with all health privacy laws. To protect privacy and confidentiality, only the following people can access Registry information:



- The parent or legal guardian who registers their child or young adult
- The young adult who self registers
- HERO Kids Registry staff
- EMS and ED providers who are treating the child or young adult



How families register with HERO Kids


- Register online with a computer or tablet at <u>www.herokidsregistry.org</u>. We recommend having the Registration Guide available.
- Registration takes 15-60 minutes
- Provider-signed emergency information form or protocol letter may be included
- Welcome letter, stickers, and a backpack tag with the HERO Kids Registry ID number will be mailed





What information will families enter into the Registry?

- Allergies and medications
- Emergency protocol letters
- Emergency Information Forms
- Factors that may impact care
- Medical and/or behavioral conditions
- Medical equipment or technology
- Parent or legal guardian contact information
- What EMS may observe







HERO Kids registration form

- Once registration is complete a PDF will be generated for families and young adults to print for their records
- We recommend putting a copy on the refrigerator for EMS access and sharing a copy with caregivers, schools, etc.

Program summary




- For <u>all</u> Oregon children and young adults through age 26
- HERO Kids should be integrated into routine emergency medical care
- Portable and accessible across state
- Excellent tool for emergency preparedness and reunification

Overview of Oregon



Demographics:

16% live in rural and frontier areas

Target Population:

 All of Oregon's 869,000 children (174,000 Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs)

In 2021:

 16,247 children 0-18 experienced a medical emergency requiring a call to Oregon EMS (OHA '22)




Enablers

- Technology: 13 years success with Oregon Portable Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment (POLST) Registry
- Workforce: EMS is trained and familiar with Oregon POLST Registry (OPR)
- Partnerships: strong relationships between EMSC, F2F, and Title V
- **Support:** 20+ letters of support from professional organizations, EMS providers, hospitals, and families
- Funding: 3 sources



Oregon POLST Registry

- Began statewide operations December 2009
- Dedicated FTE
- 250,000+ active registrants (OPR '22)
- 2022: hotline received average of <u>201</u> calls per month from EMS & EDs (OPR '22)





Barriers

- Technology: Internet and technology access for first responders and families
- Workforce: Outside of population centers, emergency medical services are often volunteer-based
- Education: Requires outreach to all families, individuals through age 26, and the health care workforce

Partnership: EMSC, F2F and Title V

- Authentic partnership
- Inclusion at every step
- Continued commitment

Development process: exploration



We asked ourselves: What would HERO Kids look like? Who would it be for?

- Brainstorming and system mock-up
- Expertise from partners was key
 - ➤ Listening session 1: EMS, ED, and other professionals
 - ➤ Listening session 2: families and youth



Development process: ideas to action

- Business plan
- Letters of support
- Secured start up funds
- Contracted for registry build
- Convened advisory committee and workgroups
- Oregon POLST Registry signed MOU for business office operations





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Development process: implementation

- 2020-2023: Developed educational materials
 - ➤ Info sheets, registration guide, videos, stakeholder updates, etc.
- 2022: Developed informational website
- September 12, 2022: First registration
- October 3, 2022: Registry hotline available for EMS and ED Providers
- October 21, 2022: Launched OREMS app



HEALTH EMERGENCY READY OREGON



With HERO Kids Registry, any Oregon family can make sure the people caring for their child in an emergency have the information they need.

- In an emergency, first responders and emergency departments can get HERO Kids Registry information in less than 90 seconds
- Families decide what information emergency responders need (like their child's health conditions, medications, allergies, behaviors, etc.).
- HERO Kids Registry is confidential and HIPAA-compliant. The information is only shared with medical providers during an emergency.
- HERO Kids Registry is available to any Oregonian (birth through 26 years).
- HERO Kids Registry information can be updated or cancelled any time.
- There is NO COST to families for using HERO Kids Registry.










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
New Registrants, 9/12/22-8/31/23





Children and Young Adults Registered


- Registrants in 21 of 36 counties

OREMS App: Agency Accounts


- OREMS App is in use in 23 of 36 counties

Ongoing:

- Marketing and education
 - Continue to work with the Pediatric Pandemic Network (PPN) to improve outreach
 - Quarterly stakeholder updates
- Advisement and feedback from family and youth representatives
- Work with community-based organizations

2024: Looking to legislate program funding

Lessons Learned

- Build relationship between F2F and EMSC programs
- Include (and compensate) families and young adults with diverse experiences and give them ample time to contribute
- Include stakeholders early in the process
- Leverage existing infrastructure
- Working with child welfare systems requires extra time
- Education is ongoing and foundational to successful implementation
