What Exactly does it mean to form a relationship??







Refers to a working arrangement that will foster pleasant and effective two-way communication between you and the decision maker.

The relationship doesn't have to be highly personal, or a friendship

It needs to be one of mutual trust and respect, and to be based on mutual interest in a particular set of issues and on mutual benefit.





Why are Relationships with Decision Makers Important?

- All politics, almost no matter how you define the term, comes down in the end to personal relationships.
- All of us listen particularly to those we know, like, and trust.
- We're more likely to agree with the one presented by someone with whom we have a good relationship.



Whom do you need to Develop a Relationship with?

- The short answer is....EVERYONE POSSIBLE!
- Your own State and Federal Legislators
- Legislators to whom your issue is crucial
- Legislators who have a personal passion for your issue
- Don't forget about their Aides and staff

How do we meet Decision Makers?



Best is face to face



Phone calls



You can almost always meet with a state representative. In most states, legislative districts contain fewer than 50,000 people, so every voter is important.



In rural districts or small towns, you may be able to catch the representative when they pick up their mail at the post office



So, I have a meeting... Now what?



Know what you want to talk about.

Be clear, concise, and focused on your issue. If possible, have a fact sheet



Identify the issue clearly.

Keep it simple.

Do not overload with excessive amount of information



Who has time for a meeting?
